Dear Friends,

In recent months I have used the phrase "Lutheran Christians" more frequently as an invitation to explore what I believe to be the best theology and interpretation of scripture. I've heard it said, "If you want a feel for the richness of the phrase "Word of God," ask Lutherans."

A number of years ago Dave Daubert shared with me the draft of his book titled "Lutheran Trump Cards - Playing our Best Hand in the 21st Century". In the preface he writes, "At the heart of this book is the belief that there is something at the core of the movement that has become known as "Lutheran" that is worth thinking about in the 21st century. Recent studies about the place of religion in North America show an ongoing decline in interest and commitment to the church as a place for people to live out their spiritual journeys. More and more people are referring to themselves as "spiritual, but not religious." It is not that the majority of them lost interest in God or have taken up atheism as a worldview. Quite the contrary, interest in spirituality may, in some ways, be higher than ever. But more and more people are not looking to organized religion for the answers to their spiritual questions."

He continues, "'There is great treasure in this Lutheran stuff, and many of us aren't quite sure what it is!' Somehow, many of us have simply taken these things for granted and have lost sight of our own unique insights. Others among us know that, at some basic level, they semi-remember things from their confirmation classes years ago but have no way of using or making sense of them today. If these great things are there for us, how can we discern them, and make them fresh and useful again?"

Church leaders, Dave reports, ask him all the time how can we help people in our congregation to be more energized and excited about their faith in what God has done in Jesus Christ. They ask, how can we revitalize congregations to be spiritually more helpful to people? What do leaders need to know and do in order to help the people they work with in the congregations they lead work more effectively?

While brief, only 68 pages, this book is powerful. It contains the keys to unlocking what many of us have come to know as the foundational pillars of our faith in God. This little book was written to nurture and invite conversation. Remember – bible study, prayer and holy conversation are or should be our community gathering time agenda. Those are my brief words for this moment. The following were my words to Dave nearly a decade ago.

"Our core theological convictions, what Dave Daubert calls the Trump Cards of our Lutheran heritage, when understood and articulated, instill confidence and courage to love and enjoy God more fully. Five centuries later, the voice of Martin Luther can still be heard in Daubert's latest work. Rather than feeling exhausted, wondering if you can pull off another new program or practice, you will, with refreshing awareness, smile at the cards God has dealt you: Trump Cards reminding you of the victorious life you are called to experience and share with others."

You're invited to go deeper. This fall attend a small group, join us in November for a weekend with Dave and Marlene Daubert, and of course come and worship with your siblings in Christ.

## The Case for Christ by Lee Strobel (5 sessions) Monday, September 23, 30, October 7, 14, 21 at 6:30pm

Are you curious about Jesus – Fable, Teacher, Prophet, Messiah? Scott Scheiry is facilitating a small group based on the text, *The Case for Christ* by Lee Strobel, a one-time atheist and legal editor for the Chicago Tribune. Using discussion and a video Bible Study, participants in this five-week group will learn about Strobel's investigative reporting with experts to uncover evidence for Jesus Christ as the Son of God. This is an accessible and brief text by Dave Daubert, a Lutheran pastor, teacher, consultant, and coach. Come learn about our core Lutheran values and how we might enhance them in our Lutheran community that is St. John's. This class is appropriate for anyone who wants to gain or refresh their knowledge of what it means to be a Lutheran Protestant Christian and learn how to follow through with Lutheran action and witness.






#### JR. YOUTH RETREAT

#### READINESS RITUALS

September means Back to School. As the month begins, K-12 students in our community have finished their first week of school, and college students have been at the books for even longer. Here at St. John's, we eagerly anticipate welcoming our preschool students on September 9. We can't wait!

When I ponder Back to School, I think of the rituals we perform to get ready. I've always loved the smell of new crayons and pencils, the feel of crisp new notebooks, and the satisfying sight of a stack of ready school supplies. With my own elementary-aged children at home, I carefully gathered items on their teachers' school supply list and chose special first day of school outfits. In my classroom, I've posted student names, checked

paper and glue supplies, written welcome letters, consulted colleagues, and outlined lesson plans. Each of these readiness rituals brings me one step closer to that moment when we joyfully open the Preschool entrance doors and usher in a new set of learners.

Maybe you're not in a Back to School season of life, but you probably have readiness rituals of your own. You might check the weather or map your route before an outing, mow the lawn or clean the house before guests arrive, or consume coffee to kick off your day.

The Bible recommends readiness rituals, too. Consider:

"Set your hearts on things above, where Christ is" (Colossians 3:1). Consciously direct the attention of your heart – your affection, your emotions, your passion—toward Christ.

"Know that the LORD is God" (Psalm 100:3). Feed your mind this truth.

"Pray in the Spirit on all occasions" (Eph 6:18). God is present for every single second of your day, so talk to him about all the day's pieces. No piece is too small.

"Give thanks to the LORD, for he is good" (Ps 136:1). Always add thanksgiving. God commands it, and giving thanks is great for your attitude and mindset.

"Commit to the LORD whatever you do, and he will establish your plans" (Prov 16:3). Finish your preparation for the day with a decision to commit whatever you do to the God who made you and loves you.

If you're talking about this topic with children, you can simplify these steps. Love God. Think about God. Talk to God about everything. Say thank you. Ask God for help with the choices you make. Take a moment today to think about your readiness rituals. And Happy Back to School to you!

#### DO YOU SHOP AT REDNER'S MARKET?

St. John's Preschool collects Redner's receipts which are used to earn money for our school.

Receipts are totaled monthly and taken back to Redner's. After about 6 weeks we receive a check for 1% of the total. A typical year yields approximately \$700 – \$800. This money is then used to purchase educational items above and beyond our operational budget. Simply bring your receipts to church or preschool and place in either the dropbox located outside the preschool entrance (exterior) or the dropbox on the Parish House main office door (interior).

You must use your Redner's Club Card each time you checkout in order for the receipt to count. If you don't have a Club Card ask at the Customer Service Desk.

#### YOUTH RETREAT PROMPTS DEEPER THINKING

I had the joy of being able to attend another one of our church retreats July 28-31 in Avalon, New Jersey. I have been attending these retreats for the past four years and have been lucky to be able to bring one of my best friends for three of them and bring my other best friend for this most recent one. I have always enjoyed these trips but this time was definitely my favorite one so far.

We had many great discussions that were led by our chaperones on the trip and my two friends and I were given the opportunity to pick a passage in the bible and find a way to teach it to the group. This was a very unique experience for me because it allowed me to be able to sit down with my friends and have a type of conversation that we would never normally have had with each other. We spent a good two hours talking and writing down what we were going to say to explain how the passage not only related to something in life but also how to talk this out with the other people on the trip.

We chose Zechariah 7:8-10, where it talks about true justice, compassion, and mercy. We then compared this to something we've learned through our Tae Kwon Do practice - the Hwa-Rang code which comes from Korea around 600 A.D. This code is an ancient warrior code that was developed during the Three Kingdoms period by Buddhist monk Won Gwang Beop Sa. The code is based on five codes of honor that include loyalty to the nation, respect for parents, faithfulness to friends, courage in battle, and avoiding unnecessary violence and killing. We asked the question if justice and mercy can equate? This was a great experience for me because I was glad to be able to sit down with my friends and talk about something on a deeper level than we ever would have back home.

I want to say thank you to Pastor Bob and all the other chaperones for allowing us to go on these trips every year and also a big thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Erb and Mr. and Mrs. Gheer for cooking for us the whole trip.












#### RETREAT DOODLES

# THIRD HEAVEN? 2 Corinthians 12: 1-4...

Did you catch it in July? Susan Hill was the lector. She read the above verses. Paul talks about being caught up to the third heaven. Did you know there are three heavens? Is there an elevator to get there? Where are the other two heavens? Are they different levels or floors? Let's try to make some sense of this.

Many ancient people thought there were many heavens, as many as seven. Ancient Jewish cosmology/apocalyptic literature held a common belief in multiple heavens or layers of heaven. Rabbinic thought equated the third heaven with Paradise. Yet, Paradise is not defined.

The first level of heaven is the sky and earth's atmosphere. See Genesis 1:1, Matthew 6:26, and Hebrews 4:14. Heaven's second level is outer space - the location of the stars and planets. See Deuteronomy 10:14, Psalm 148:4, and Matthew 24:29.

The third heaven is a Jewish expression for the immediate presence of God (p.1086), a place of perfection, being deeper in the presence of God. It is the most divine realm. It is possibly a symbolic or metaphoric expression to describe profound spiritual truths or insights. The concept of the third heaven teaches us that spiritual encounter is real; to focus on God and his revelation; and that personal relationship with God is the basis of faith.

Please note that God is not contained in one place. His presence is everywhere. See Hebrews 8:1 and 9:24. Refer back to 2 Corinthians 12:1-10 - Paul shows his humility by referring to himself in the third person: "I know a man..." He does not recount his vision with boasting. Rather, he does not speak of his vision at all, and then he goes on to talk about a thorn in his flesh from God. It is possible that this thorn was acquired at the same time as his vision. Perhaps this affliction is to remind Paul (and us) that God works in mysterious ways and it is OK if we don't understand those ways. Just as it is OK for Paul not to divulge his vision. The third heaven waits for us and maybe when we get there we can define it.

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
