Have you been sustained by God's peace this year? Or has relationship conflict been a source of trouble and heartache? Discord with others can be extremely distressing. When we feel defensive or on the receiving end of negative emotions, we can easily forget how God wants us to act. I suspect we all are aware of the challenges that often arise between people, and the way they can tear relationships apart – people, marriages, parent-child, churches, communities, and even nations.

I hope the following excerpts from the late Dr. Charles Stanley will be helpful. My prayer is that you will hear his love for God and wisdom that was developed throughout his many decades of service to God's church. I know his life was one filled with the highest of highs and the lowest of lows.

Dr. Stanley writes, "I recall a conversation with a woman who told me she was having trouble finding a good church in her area. It wasn't because there weren't enough to choose from, but there was dissension and division in all the churches she knew about. This disunity is the sad reality for many churches today."

"I believe most conflicts in churches are relational, not theological. One member is offended by another. This group wants to direct the church one way, while another wants it to follow their agenda. The root cause is failure to behave in a way that honors Christ and maintains the unity of the body."

"Life in the kingdom of God should be the warmest of environments for Christ followers living in a hostile world. But whether in the church or in the world, we are called to be peacemakers. That's why Peter gave them a practical pattern of living: "To sum up, all of you be harmonious, sympathetic, loving, compassionate, and humble; not returning evil for a site of the table in the table is the practice of former and pattern of the site of the practice of the

evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead; for you were called for the very purpose that you would inherit a blessing" [1 Peter 3:8–9]. As Christ followers we may not agree on every issue, but with minds set on Christ, we can live in peace and harmony with one another. The Holy Spirit will do this challenging work within us as we seek God. Only then will we be able to do what Peter says next – "don't return evil for evil or insult for insult." Instead, give a blessing by speaking well of, and doing good to, your offender.

Romans 12:18 says, "If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all people." Sympathy, compassion, love, kindness, and humility are more effective in winning someone to Christ than our rudeness, insults, anger, and harshness."

Let Jesus shine through you so that others can see in your behavior, attitudes, and words a life transformed by Christ.

On Reformation Sunday, October 27, you are invited to join a Zoom Workshop with Dave and Marlene Daubert (register online). Dave is the author of Lutheran Trump Cards, the text we'll be using in the small group starting Monday, November 18. Dave and Marlene would like to hear from us – our questions about Lutheran faith, beliefs, and practice. Our questions to them will help them prepare for a retreat they will be leading with us at St. John's on Saturday, November 16 (register online). On Sunday, November 17, Dave and Marlene will be welcomed to the pulpit to provide the sermon. The small group offered in November will build on the momentum of the Zoom Workshop and in-person Retreat, focusing on Lutheran Trump Cards.

He has been interviewed on NPR and is the popular author of several books and articles about mission, leadership, and the practice of ministry (including Lutheran Trump Cards, Living Lutheran, Reclaiming the 'V' Word (Vocation), The Invitational Christian, and Becoming a Hybrid Church). His newest book is Beyond Chit-Chat: Sharing Stories that Matter and was co-written with his friend and colleague Elaina Salmon.

Dave enjoys being active and likes to play golf and pickleball, enjoys reading and playing music, and has lovingly tortured his wife Marlene with 41 years of never-ending renovation projects in every home they have owned. Dave and Marlene live in Elgin, IL with their dog Elsa.



We're back! What a joy to open the Preschool doors every morning and see the smiling faces lined up, backpacks loaded, ready to adventure into a new day's learning.

In early September, we welcomed families with an Open House, where students met their teachers and scouted out their new classrooms. During the second week of school we held Back to School Night, where families were introduced to the program and then spent time with their child's teachers, learning about curriculum and expectations.

In the classroom, we focused our learning experiences on friendship and emotions, two topics that help us as we establish routines and develop healthy ways to relate to one another as the school year progresses. HOW ARE ISRAEL, JUDAH, CANAAN, AND PALESTINE DIFFERENT?


These Old Testament names can be confusing. Let's look at each name in light of the area's history. (This history will be brief and only highlight what we need to discuss the above names.)

Terah is the father of Abram, Nahor, and Haran. They were born in Ur, which is in Chaldea, near the southern portion of the Euphrates River (current day Iraq). After Haran, the youngest son, dies prematurely, the family leaves to travel to Haran (the city, not a person), located in upper Mesopotamia. It is there that God spoke to Abram about going to "the land which I shall show you." (Gen.12:1). They then set out for and came to the land of Canaan. (Gen. 12:5)

As we know, Abram's name was changed to Abraham. He was the father of Isaac with Sarah (and Ishmael with Hagar). Isaac continued to live in Canaan; he married Rebekah with whom he had twin boys, Esau and Jacob. Jacob and Esau had a contentious relationship – Jacob always seemed to best his older twin. As Jacob was journeying, after his confrontation with Laban, his father-in-law, he sent messengers to his brother to curry his favor. The night before the brothers met, Jacob wrestled with an angel. The angel told Jacob that his name was changed to Israel because he struggled with the angel and with God and had prevailed. (Gen. 32:27-29; 33:9-15) At this time, the land was still Canaan and Israel referred to the man Jacob.



Jacob and his wives had 12 sons (daughters didn't count, so we don't know how many total children they had). His sons' names were Reuben, Simeon, Levi, Judah, Issachar, Zebulun, Joseph, Benjamin, Dan, Naphtali, Gad and Asher. They all eventually ended up in Egypt because of famine. They and their families lived there for many generations - until a new Pharaoh feared they would overrun the Egyptians.



Enter Moses, Aaron and the plagues. Pharaoh did decide to let the Hebrews leave, but not without some drama. Once this merry band of Hebrews passed through the Red Sea, their GPS did not function. They spent 40 years wandering around the Sinai Peninsula. When Moses died, Joshua took over as group leader and entered Canaan. It took a number of battles, but Canaan was eventually divided among the 12 tribes of Israel. Please note that Joseph's name and Levi's name are not on the map. Joseph is represented by his sons: Manasseh and Ephraim. The Levites became the priests and would not own land. (Joshua 13; 14:1-5)


The 12 tribes united under Saul and were strengthened under David. After the reign of Solomon, the united Israelite kingdom split into two: Israel, the northern kingdom consisting of 10 tribes and Judah, (now Israel refers to the land and the people inhabiting it) the southern kingdom, consisting of the tribes of Judah and Benjamin. As separate political entities, they each had different kings. (I Kings 12:22-24)

Israel was invaded by the Assyrians (2 Chronicles 32), followed by the Babylonians many years later (2 Kings 25: 1-21; 2 Chronicles 36: 17-21). The division of Israel and Judah lasted until Jerusalem fell

and the Judeans were taken into exile in Babylonia.

Alexander the Great then ruled this area until his death in 325 B.C. His generals divided the area, calling the area between Egypt and Southwest Asia Palestine. In 1948, this area was divided between Israel and Jordan, with a small strip of land claimed by Egypt, called the Gaza Strip. As the result of this division, there is no longer a country call Palestine. Arabs, who do not recognize the land belonging to Israel, continue to call the land Palestine.
